Profile - Colin Chambers

I was born in England, but grew up in South Africa.

In the course of time I became a career officer in the South African Navy, in various different roles, functions and postings, reaching the rank of Commander. (Well Lieutenant Commander, but that rank is addressed as Commander.)

It was during my time in the Navy that I became a committed Christian, and wanted to transfer to become a Navy Chaplain, but there wasn't a vacancy at the time and I was asked to become a Prison Chaplain at Pollsmoor Prison in Cape Town as well as for the Robben Island Maximum Security Prison.

It was there that I came in contact with Nelson Mandela and other leading African political prisoners.

I returned to live in the UK in the early 2000's and have been active in ministry here to this day, being an itinerant preacher, teacher and speaker, as well as being the volunteer chaplain for Hampshire Homes for Veterans, who have fallen on troubled times, based in Gosport.
