### September Walk – Jim's Last Walk (114)

Our September walk on Wednesday 27th September was a repeat of Jim Oliver's last walk a year ago around the Stansted Estate with lunch afterwards in The Pavilion tea shop.

Catherine Oliver joined your Walk Leader and our Secretary John Hargreaves for a walk along estate roads and fields on a dry and sunny day. The only wildlife seen were a pair of young deer seen on the skyline running across the field in the distance and a solitary Highland cow in another field close to our walk. Last year we left the road at the historic Grade 1 listed house known as Lumley Seat to walk across a grassy field to Woodlands Lane but this time the field was planted with tall maize still awaiting harvesting through which the path, although flat, provided no views and was littered with many loose flints so was avoided. Instead the road was followed further towards Broadreed Farm as far as Oak Copse and a track then followed south to get to Woodlands Lane. The fields south of Woodlands Lane, which earlier had standing wheat and maize, had been harvested by the date of our walk so provided very good open but distant views of Stansted House and were easy to cross as part of our onward route through fields and paths back to our starting point. On approaching the Garden Centre car park a railway locomotive whistle was heard which on later investigation was found to belong to the Stansted Light Railway, a seven and a quarter inch gauge miniature railway running through the arboretum part of the park near the house. Grandparents may like to note that the railway runs on Wednesdays and Saturdays.

Following our return a very enjoyable light meal was consumed with good conversation in the Potting Shed area of the Pavilion tea room. When told of the small number actually coming the Pavilion dropped their requirement for us to pre-order and we were allowed to order food and drink on arrival and pay individually afterwards in the usual way, for which your Walk Leader and your Treasurer were very grateful.
