5 PRESS REPORT



Weather Lore "Why the Shepherd was happy with the red sky."

Britain and Japan shared similarities in climates, members of Chichester Probus Club were told at their monthly lunch meeting at Crouchers, recently (March 14).

The speaker was Bill Avenell a retired Christ's Hospital geography teacher.

He said that both were islands chains which experienced the effects of four major air masses – from east, west, north and south and both were affected by proximity to major land masses which

experienced extreme cold in the interior.

In addition, the island nations were on the Coriolis Force which cause winds moving air streams which gave rise to our prevailing westerlies.

Air masses, he said, did not like to mix, resulting in air pressure changes, cold and warm fronts - conditions that caused air to rise then cooling so unable to hold water vapour. This resulted in

changeable weather.

These variables were the reason so much folk lore existed in Britain. Much of it held some truth. The rest did not.
